Reserve early! Reserve campsites, cabins and group areas two days to nine months in advance by phone, Reservations Northwest (1-800-452-5687). Campsites and cabins also are reservable through www.oregonstateparks.org.

Farewell Bend State Park lies in an area by the Snake River's Brownlee Reservoir where pioneers traveling on the historic Oregon Trail once rested and enjoyed one last look at the river.

Park Amenities

- 101 electrical sites with water (reservable)
- 30 tent sites with water nearby
- Hiker/biker sites
- 2 log cabins (seasonal)
- Group tent camp
- Picnic tables, fire rings at all sites
- Hot showers and flush toilets
- Firewood for sale
- RV dump station (located near registration booth; please do not dump sewer waste into the basins at your site)
- Horseshoe pits, basketball hoops and volleyball court (bring camping or day-use permit receipt to rent equipment)

Universal Access

Electrical site 47 is accessible to campers with disabilities (located near accessible restroom).

Play It Safe

Enjoy the park, but please obey posted safety rules. This is a remote area and emergency help may be difficult to reach.

A Name from the Past

After following the Snake River for 330 miles, Oregon Trail pioneers rested above the bend in the river here, then bid farewell to the Snake River and continued their trek.

Wagon ruts can still be seen north of the park. Watch for a small iron cross, visible from U.S. 30, that marks the location where Snake River Shoshone Indians battled with pioneer travelers in 1860. Restored covered wagons rest at the park entrance and next to the Oregon Trail kiosk. Visit the National Historic Oregon Trail Interpretive Center on Flagstaff Hill west near Baker City.

Cabin Camping

Enjoy a roof over your head from May 1-Sept. 30 by renting one of our log cabins. Each cabin is 13-by-13-feet with a six-foot porch. A full bed and two bunks, with mattresses, sleep four people. Each has electrical service, heating and air conditioning.

Brownlee Reservoir

The park's lighted boat ramp and dock lead to Brownlee Reservoir. To check on current reservoir levels, call the park (541-869-2365), or Idaho Power at 1-800-422-3143 (or go online: www.idahopower.com). Brownlee Reservoir has excellent bass and catfish fishing. There is a fish-cleaning station by the boat ramp parking lot.

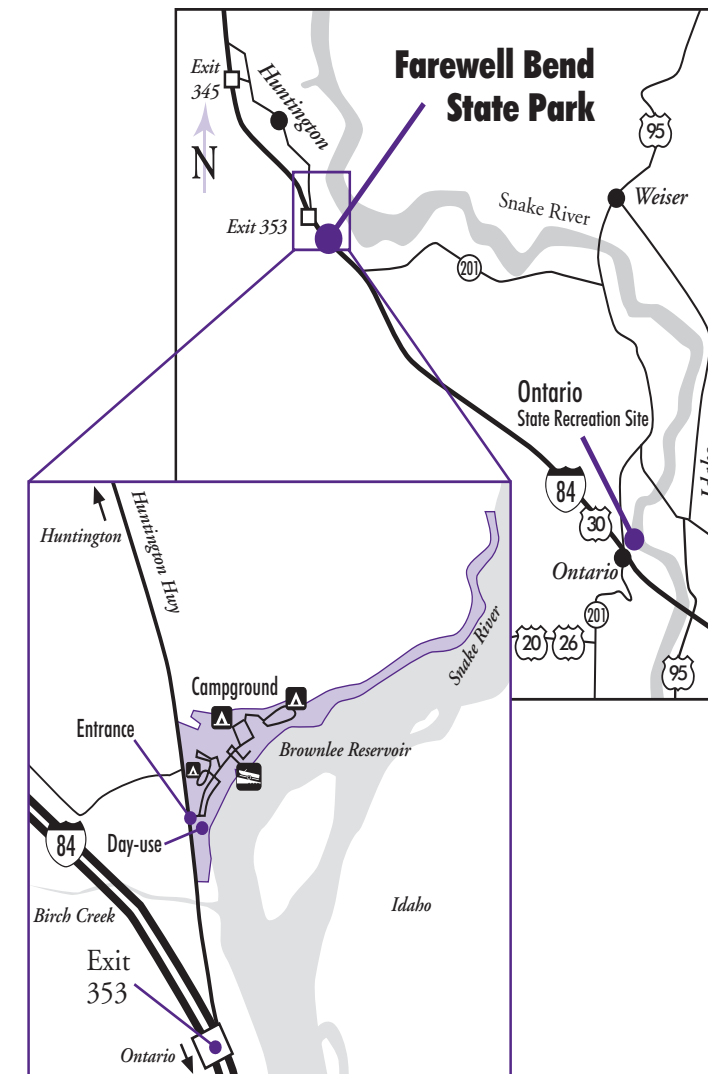
Day-Use Fees

Day-use area passes are needed all year to use the park's large, shaded day-use area and boat ramp. Display a daily pass, a 12 or 24-month pass, or your camping receipt on the driver side of your dashboard. A camping receipt is equal to a daily permit for those days registered. Purchase a daily permit for \$3 at the registration booth or at a day-use fee station. The 12-month pass (\$25) and 24-month pass (\$40) are sold at the park office. Also call 1-800-551-6949.

Nature Shows

Wildflowers in the spring and summer illuminate the hillsides. If you're lucky, you'll see wildlife like deer, pronghorn, geese, eagles, chukars, and Hungarian partridge. Evening interpretive programs are presented from Memorial Day through Labor Day. See the park host for dates and times.

Visit a Frontier Town

In 1870, Miller's Stagecoach Station was established in nearby Huntington before the railroad arrived in 1884. The town soon became the shipping point for cattle. Learn more about the town at the Huntington Museum, open 1-4 p.m. on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day through Labor Day. For special after-hour and off-season tours, call 541-869-2873.

Please help make camping here a safe and enjoyable experience by following these and other park rules:

- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- Vehicles must be parked on paved areas only.
- Bicycles are permitted on park roads, but ride them with the traffic flow. Riders under age 16 must wear helmets.
- When your pet is not confined in a vehicle or tent, you must hold it, hold on to its collar or physically control it on a leash that is no longer than six feet. Wastes must be properly removed. (For details, ask for our "Pets in the Parks" brochure.)
